This week in 4th grade:

Literacy Workshop—Social Studies Focus (Tues-Thurs)

We will be learning about how interdependence in colonial America was essential to survival and how the different roles that people had during this time helped with their survival. We will recognize that inferences help us better understand what an author is trying to tell us and we will make inferences based on primary sources. We will then begin a research project of colonial trades.

Science: Monday, Friday

We are wrapping up our unit on static electricity and lightning and beginning to work on current electricity and circuits.

Literacy—

We will be reading the junior novel and completing a character study of Ebenezer Scrooge. Students will be introduced to the setting of Victorian England; a society not unlike our own and will meet the spirit characters who will unravel the "whys" of Scrooge's character and bear witness to his transformation. Students will delve into the mind of Scrooge and use text evidence and their knowledge of story elements to map his changes through the book. Students will create Spirit Trading cards for each of Scrooge's visitors; describe these characters, what lessons they teach and the symbolism of each spirit. In addition, students will use text evidence to identify the different types of literary conflict in the story, infer the theme and describe how the different settings in the story advance the plot, as well as support characterization, mood, and theme. Finally, students will watch a movie version and compare it to the book. This classic story reminds us of charity, generosity, and that it is never too late to change for the good. The novel is set at Christmastime but it is not a Christmas story. It does however, make references to the Christmas holiday. If you have any issues with the character and novel study due to religious reasons, please let me know and an alternative study will be provided for your student.

Writing—

We will have our Week 9 DLI test on Friday. We will be completing the writing assignment about Black Sunday and using this time to write responses about the literary elements we find in Scrooge.

Math-

This week we will continue to practice dividing. We will work on division word problems using the RRSP strategy. That stands for Read the problem, Restate the question, Solve the problem, Plug the answer into the statement. We will have our final division quiz on Thursday. On Friday we will learn double digit by double digit multiplication.
