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This week in 4th grade:

Literacy Workshop-

Social Studies: Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday morning

We will be learning about how interdependence in colonial America was essential to survival and how the different roles that people had during this time helped with their survival. We will recognize that inferences help us better understand what an author is trying to tell us and we will make inferences based on primary sources.

Science: Monday, Friday—

We will be learning about the concepts of static electricity and lightning. This will include what creates these charges of energy, how they travel, and safety rules regarding them.

Literacy—

We will be reading non-fiction articles, recognizing the text features evident in these articles and learning how to stop throughout the article to check for understanding. We will practice stopping to record our inner conversation and recognizing the main idea of a passage and details that support the main idea.

Writing—

We will be reading an article called "Black Sunday: The Shocking Story of the Biggest Dust Storm in American History." We will then imagine that we are the main character in the story and write a letter to a friend describing the storm and it's causes from the character's perspective. We will NOT have DLI this week or spelling words. We will resume next week.

Math—

This week we will be learning about prime and composite numbers and how to find the factors of a number using the associative property and division. We will solve multi-step word problems including the four different operations. We will be solving division problems with a three digit dividend, for example 634÷3.
